TRICOT

(France - Brittany)

The dance is in fact a combination of two popular Breton dances, *Hanter Dro* and *An Dro* in alternating sequences. Tricot means «knitting», referring to the two dances being intertwined. This dance is also sometimes simply called *Hanter Dro-An Dro*.

Pronunciation: TREE-koh

Music: Yves and France Moreau CD

Meter: 2/4

Formation: Open mixed circle. Hands joined by little finger. Dancers are very close to

each other, with elbows bent and arms «interlocked » as sometimes used in Turkish dances. Face ctr, wt on R. Dance moves to the L, so leader is at L

end of the line.

Styling: Small light and bouncy steps.

1-8	Introduction : Slow melody on accordion which comes to an abrupt stop. Dance begins right after stop.
1 2 3 4-24	1. «Hanter Dro» (3-meas sequence) With wt on R, step on L slightly diag fwd L (1) close R to L (2) Step on L next to R (1) slight lift on L ft, raising R knee slightly (2) Small step on R (1) Slight lift on R with slight pick up of L knee (2) Repeat pattern of meas 1-3, seven more times On the last meas, extend both arms fwd and push them fully back in preparation for the next dance pattern.
	2. «An Dro» (4-meas sequence)
1	Footwork: Meas. 1: Step on L diag L (ct 1) step on R next to L (ct &) step on L diag L (ct 2)
2	Step on R slightly bkwd (ct 1) step on L next to R (ct &) step on R slightly bkw (ct 2)
	Arm motions: For meas. 1, arms describe a "loop" motion fwd and out, and on meas. 2, arms describe a "loop" motion inward and down.
3-16	Repeat pattern of meas 1-2, seven more times.
	Dance repeats from Fig. 1, with arms coming back to their bent elbow position.
